

Freshman Year Timeline

Fall:	
	Get involved at school. Join a club, organization, or sports team.
ū	Work permit. Don't forget to pick up a work permit if you get a job. Work permits can be picked up in the High School Office or the Guidance Office.
ū	Communicate with your teachers and take advantage of Freshman tutoring right away if you are struggling in any of your classes.
ū	Attendance in your classes is very important. Please be familiar with the MSHS attendance policy including the attendance policy incentives.
	Tutoring. Please reach out to your School Counselor for tutoring options.
<u>Wint</u>	<u>er</u> :
	Explore careers. Spend some time thinking about what you would like to do after high school. The ONET (www.onetonline.org) is a great website to use for researching different careers.
	Find volunteer opportunities. Volunteer experience looks great on a resume when you are applying for a job. It also looks good for a college application.
	Update your Educational Development Plan (EDP). Be sure to make any changes to your EDP to reflect your future goals as well as course planning for next year.
ū	Complete the course sign up process for Sophomore year.
Spring:	
ū	Stay on track with your classes and grades. Meet with your School Counselor if you think you might need credit recovery.
	Take the PSAT 9 given in April at school.
	Keep your grades up!
	Explore options for part-time work or volunteering over the summer.
Summer:	
ū	Explore jobs and careers. Use some time during the summer to continue your career research. Talk to people you know in these careers to find out more information.
ū	Visit colleges . It's never too early to start college visits. Take a tour and be sure to talk to someone from the admissions and financial aid offices.

Don't want to attend a four-year university, but still want to go to college?

Attend a community college

- The programs offered are often a direct response to the needs of the current job market.
- In just two years, students can earn an associate degree or a certification as a veterinary technician, a dental hygienist, web designer, etc.
- Option of transferring to a four-year college after receiving your associate degree.

Enroll in technical college

- Technical colleges specialize in career-driven courses that teach skills that apply to specific careers, such as carpentry or electrical work.
- Unlike a four-year college, you aren't required to take classes that aren't related to your career focus.
- Skilled trade workers are a disproportionately older population. As they begin to retire, there will be a large number of jobs to fill. Technical college will prepare you to take on those roles.

College Alternatives

Try an apprenticeship or fellowship

- Apprenticeships offer the opportunity to learn a trade in an in-demand field while getting paid.
- Programs offer on-the-job training from experienced professionals. The construction industry currently makes up two-thirds of apprenticeship programs in the U.S.
- If you have a great idea but don't want to wait four years to execute it, consider applying for a fellowship. Examples: Thiel Fellowship, Echoing Green, Enstitute, and UnCollege Gap Year.

Start a business

Join the military

- There are many practical benefits to joining a branch of the military. In addition to a competitive salary, free health care and little-to-no living costs, the military will pay your tuition while in service.
- Soldiers have access to a variety of online learning options and there are satellite classrooms on many bases. Once your service is complete, you can also use the GI Bill to pay for part of your tuition. The military also offers retirement with benefits after 20 years of service.

• Volunteering isn't just a way to give back. It builds character and gives you access to experiences outside of a formal educational setting that will be useful when you enter the workforce.
